Our School

Founded in 2012 as the Episcopal School of Los Angeles, and located in the heart of Old Hollywood, the School of Los Angeles is a co-ed, college-preparatory day school serving grades six through twelve. Over half of our students receive need-based tuition assistance, empowering us to bring together a community that truly reflects the diversity of the city. Study after study shows that students in diverse learning environments have greater cultural competencies, are more empathetic, more creative, less willing to accept the norm, and are better prepared for higher education and life beyond.

Every year the School of Los Angeles enrolls just as many students who know what it means to live in the most trying financial circumstances—students whose convictions are forged with a visceral understanding of economic disparity in our nation, and whose perspectives are therefore vital—as we do students who come from significant affluence. In a seminar of fifteen—our average class size—it is often the case that no two students will approach the issue at hand from the same socioeconomic and cultural background.

At the School of Los Angeles, we pose a new question: What happens when committed students from all walks of life spend every day in the classroom or out in the city together—growing, learning, and forming lifelong bonds? What happens when they are given the tools to understand their own histories, the history of the city, and the possibilities of social transformation?

Curriculum

Building upon the competencies and analytical understandings that come from essential studies in English, History, Social Sciences, Mathematics, Physical and Biological Sciences, Global Languages, and Visual and Performing Arts, SLA emphasizes experiential learning, direct and sustained service work through our Service and Justice Program, and engagement in a wide array of the most important, forward-thinking fields of study. Ongoing faculty commitments include: developing courses that emphasize deep inquiry and exploration, modeling possibilities for students, and interdisciplinary collaboration.

Service and Justice Program

SLA's Service and Justice Program focuses on the social transformation of our students as they develop a political consciousness together. Giving of ourselves and unto others is both a pedagogical practice and a means of creating more sustainable and just living conditions for everyone. A commitment to place-based education grounds our Service and Justice Program in the city of Los Angeles and gives students the opportunity to have transformative experiences on and off campus.

Students survey and then enroll in one of four cohorts: Housing Justice, Environmental and Climate Justice, the Carceral State and Abolition, and Immigration and Sanctuary Spaces. Cohorts follow a "research, act, and reflect" model—first bringing guests to campus who are organizing and making an impact in Los Angeles, then venturing off campus and into the city together to engage directly with movement work, and finally reconvening to synthesize students' experiences. The program culminates in a deep, sustained commitment to a single organizing project or space during senior year.



GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

The School of Los Angeles offers a broad curriculum offering a full range of traditional and unique courses approved by the University of California to meet the rigorous A-G requirements. The overall graduation requirements meet or exceed entrance requirements for the University of California system.

What is Root Work?

Root Work is our commitment to draw connections, think historically, and address root issues. It reflects our understanding that culture and knowledge come from the bottom, not the top. We cannot grapple with climate catastrophe, for example, without understanding Indigenous societies and land stewardship, or without studying feminist movements and their frameworks of ecology. In these endeavors, the metaphor of "digging to the root" is useful. Knowledge production becomes dangerous when it strays too far from the lived realities of people. The old tropes of the "ivory tower" of academia and the independent school "bubble" are in fact real, and we have every reason to work against that grain. We have every reason to, as Amílcar Cabral phrased it, "return to the source."

A Forward-Thinking Pedagogy: Humanities at SLA

Each semester, SLA students in grades 10–12 select a pairing of Literature and History courses from a broad array of disciplines, including: Black Studies, Environmental Studies, Latinx Studies, Class Studies, Queer Studies, and European Studies. This provides students substantive choice in their trajectory through Upper School while also providing a firm foundation for their studies. Moreover, the humanities core affirms our commitment to a breadth of study that reflects our student body, our faculty, our city, and our world—as well as our commitment to a truly substantive college-preparatory education.

It's no secret that, over the past decades, there has been a widening gulf between high school curricula and the concepts and disciplines students are asked to contend with almost immediately at the college level. SLA's semester-based offerings model the content, depth, breadth, exploratory demands, and structure of a university course of study.

Reporting Student Information

The transcripts and GPA reflect all coursework and grades, beginning in grade nine. Courses are offered on a semester basis; grades are recorded on the transcript and GPA is computed in January and June.

GPA is computed using a typical A–F grading system. All grades are unweighted; the School of Los Angeles offers no designated honors, AP or IB courses, having moved away from the AP program in 2020. Please review the curriculum section for complete information on both our conventional and unique offerings. Beginning with grade nine, all subjects, whether passed or failed, are included in the computation. A minimum of 27 credits is required for graduation. In addition, each student must complete a service and justice graduation requirement.

Due to the small size of the class, intensely collaborative nature of the coursework, and the "think aloud" nature of the classrooms, the School of Los Angeles does not rank students.

Reporting Disciplinary Actions

• Disciplinary action is defined as probation, suspension, or expulsion. If a college or university admission office asks a question regarding disciplinary action, the School of Los Angeles will respond to the question per the above definitions. Once the question is put as part of the application, we will report the disciplinary action if and when such an infraction occurs. We strongly recommend students respond to the college directly and immediately, as well.

Standardized Testing

• Since COVID, students at the School of Los Angeles have only infrequently pursued SAT or ACT testing, in large part due to the increased challenge of finding available test centers a reasonable distance from their homes. Increasing numbers of schools have moved to "School Day Testing" to assure their students a seat for testing, limiting other students' test center options. With few colleges requiring testing, most SLA students opt out, choosing to focus on their course portfolio and personal representations. We discuss testing with students on an individual basis; if students wish for their test scores to be considered, they are responsible for sending the results—including SAT, ACT, and any AP tests—directly to colleges. Please note, the School of Los Angeles moved away from offering College Board AP courses in 2020.

SLA Academic Schedule

The daily schedule is organized on a rotating block schedule. Over the course of a week, seven class periods meet three times each in one-hour or 75-minute blocks. The schedule includes special blocks each week for Chapel, daily required community lunch, "X" block where students engage in Service & Justice course work, and study hall.

Accreditation

The School of Los Angeles is fully accredited by both the Western Association of Schools and Colleges and the California Association of Independent Schools.
